2	<p style="text-align: center;">BELGIUM</p>	<p>COVID test - for all non-residents from 12 years old: PCR test carried out within 72 hours before departure - in any case (residents and non-residents, regardless of the negative test required before arrival) : PCR test on the 1st and 7th day upon arrival</p> <p>Quarantine : 10 days in any case</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • All non-essential travel to Belgium, with the exception of return travel by residents of Belgium, is prohibited until at least March 1, 2021, regardless of the nationality of the traveler. Persons traveling for an essential reason (see the list of categories at https://www.info-coronavirus.be/en/travels/) must complete and print a declaration of honor (template available on the same website) and take it with them. along with the documents proving the essential reason for the travel. • Brazilian citizens and citizens of other countries outside the European Union exempt from the visa requirement can travel to Belgium without a visa for the essential reasons listed at https://www.info-coronavirus.be/en/travels/ for less than 90 days within a 180 day period. In these cases, the Belgian Consulate General in São Paulo can issue an essential travel certificate in order to be able to prove the essential reason for the trip. Partners (out of wedlock or stable union) are under some conditions considered family members and can as such travel to Belgium with a certificate issued by the Consulate General of Belgium in São Paulo. Contact by email to saopaulo@dipobel.fed.be for more information. • All passengers arriving in Belgium, regardless of nationality, residence, country of origin, purpose of travel and means of transport, must complete the Public Health Passenger Locator Form electronically and submit it online within 48 hours before arriving in Belgium, and respect all the directions received by SMS, as well as those available on the page https://www.info-coronavirus.be/en/travels/. • All travelers from the United Kingdom, South Africa or South America (including Brazil) must undergo a compulsory PCR Covid-19 test on the 1st and 7th days after arrival in Belgium and a quarantine (absolute interdiction of leaving the residence or accommodation for any reason, including the essential reason of the trip) of 10 days. All persons not resident in Belgium (Belgian and foreign nationals) from 12 years old must, in addition, present a negative PCR Covid-19 test carried out no later than 72 hours before departure for Belgium. Proof of this negative test must be provided in Dutch, French, German or English. This negative result does not imply the release of mandatory quarantine or other mandatory tests on the 1st and 7th days after arrival. In case of returning to Belgium after a stay abroad of less than 48 hours or a stay in Belgium of less than 48 hours, tests and quarantine will not be required: even so, filling in the locator form is still mandatory. • Transit through Belgium to another country in the European Union or the Schengen Area is only allowed for citizens of the European Union and the Schengen Area. <p>For more details see the FPS Public Health website: https://www.info-coronavirus.be</p>
3	<p style="text-align: center;">BULGARIA</p>	<p>Mandatory COVID-Test before entering OR 14 days quarantine</p>	<p>The new restrictions for entering Bulgaria are valid until the 31th January:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • LIST OF LOW RISK COUNTRIES (Austria, Belgium, Croatia, Cyprus, Czechia, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Ireland, Italy, Latvia, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, the Netherlands, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain and Sweden, plus the United Kingdom, Iceland, Norway, Liechtenstein, Switzerland, Andorra, Monaco, San Marino, Vatican City, as well as Australia, Canada, Georgia, Japan, Morocco, New Zealand, Rwanda, South Korea, Thailand, Tunisia, Uruguay, Jordan and Ukraine). • EU citizens entering from countries with high risk like Brazil must present PCR test taken in 72 hours before entering or 14 days quarantine; • Nationals from countries from countries with high risk cannot enter Bulgaria, with the exception of family members of Bulgarian citizens, humanitarian cases, etc. • Diplomats and international officials of organizations can enter Bulgaria and they are exempt from presenting PCR test or quarantine. <p>http://www.mh.government.bg/bg/novini/aktualno/</p>


4	CROATIA	Mandatory 14 days quarantine	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • If foreigners do not hold the citizenship of an EU/EEA Member State or the aforementioned countries, nor have regulated stay in those countries and travel from a non-member country due to urgent personal reasons, they must prove their reason for entering the Republic of Croatia upon arriving at the border crossing point which could be: urgent personal reasons or if you are the owner or lessee (also applies to leaseholders) of real estate, movable property or seagoing vessel (ship, yacht, etc.) in the Republic of Croatia. A quarantine / self-isolation measure with health supervision for 14 days has been determined for these persons, with the possibility of shortening its duration to 7 days, if a person gets their nose and throat swabbed at their own expense seven days after entering Croatia and receives a negative PCR test result for SARS-CoV-2. • If foreigners who do not hold the citizenship of an EU/EEA Member State or the aforementioned countries nor have regulated stay in those countries want to enter the Republic of Croatia due to: Business reasons or economic interest of the Republic of Croatia, Tourist reasons or Education. These persons are not subject to a quarantine / self-isolation measure if they present a negative PCR result of a nasal and throat swab for SARS-Cov-2 at the border crossing point, which is not older than 48 hours (counting from the time of taking the swab to arriving at the border crossing point). If third-country nationals have a test older than 48 hours when entering Croatia, they will be allowed to enter Croatia, however, they will be obligated to self-isolate and re-test themselves in Croatia at their own expense. The above can be applied to passengers and crew members on yachts. • Persons who do not present a negative PCR result are subject to a mandatory 14-day quarantine / self-isolation measure. • In order to shorten the procedure at the border crossing point, we advise you to fill the announcement in advance at https://entercroatia.mup.hr • TRANSIT : Passengers in transit may travel through the Republic of Croatia provided that it is possible to enter or transit through the neighbouring country. During transit, the shortest traffic routes should be used without undue delay, including the motorway where possible. 5	CYPRUS	Covid test 72h before traveling/ upon arrival and 14 days self-isolation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Brazil is considered a category C (High Risk) country based on Epidemiological Risk factors • Mandatory registration on platform www.cyprusflightpass.gov.cy within 24 hours before traveling • A Special Permission is needed for foreign citizens traveling from Brazil to Cyprus for Professional Reasons, Family Reunification reasons (first degree kinship), Aircraft Crew Changes or Seafarers and are not permanent residents of Cyprus (diplomatic and service passport holders exempted). Applications with reason for visiting Cyprus and supporting documents should be done up to 14 days before traveling via platform https://cyprusflightpass.gov.cy/en/special-permission-request • Covid test can be done up to 72 hours before traveling, but another one can be requested upon arrival (cost falls on the traveller) • Mandatory self-isolation for 14 days after arrival (even if test is negative) for all citizens arriving from any category C country

7	DENMARK	Covid test 24h before boarding/no quarantine requirement, but strong recommendation to do 10 days self-isolation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Persons resident outside of Denmark can enter Denmark with a worthy purpose and proof of a negative COVID-19 test taken no more than 24 hours before boarding. Requirement on negative COVID-19-test is prolonged until 7 February. To prevent the spreading of the British and South African mutations of COVID-19, the Danish government has imposed a flight ban on transportation of passengers from the entire world who are unable to present a negative COVID-19 test. The ban will allow passenger flights only under the condition, that all passengers onboard the airplane have been tested negative for COVID-19 within 24 hours of boarding the plane. Children under the age of 12 will be excluded from the test requirement. There will be no restrictions on cargo flights. Passengers, who previously have been infected with COVID-19 and therefore are unable to present a negative test result must present a positive COVID-19 test result from a test performed between 14 days and eight weeks prior to the flight. These passengers are no longer perceived to be contagious. There are currently no specific requirements as to the type of COVID-19 test. The test must show whether a person is infected with COVID-19. This means that both PCR tests and antigen tests are accepted in connection with entry into Denmark whereas antibody tests do not meet the requirement. It should be noted that the test requirement also applies to Danish nationals and residents of Denmark.
8	ESTONIA	No mandatory tests but mandatory self-isolation for the persons arriving from certain countries	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Based on the coronavirus infection rate, starting from Monday 13 July, a two-week self-isolation requirement applies to people arriving in Estonia from Sweden, Portugal, Romania, Bulgaria, Croatia, the Czech Republic and Luxembourg. From the list of third countries agreed in the European Union (Algeria, Australia, Canada, Georgia, Japan, Morocco, Montenegro, New Zealand, Rwanda, Serbia, South Korea, Thailand, Tunisia and Uruguay), anyone arriving from Montenegro and Serbia must self-isolate. 10	<p style="text-align: center;">FRANCE</p>	<p>Test mandatory when arriving from Brazil (conducted less than 72 hours before boarding) + self-isolate for seven days on arrival + second PCR test at the end of that period</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • From January 18, all travelers arriving in France from a country outside the European space (EU Member States and Andorra, the Holy Sea, Iceland, Liechtenstein, Monaco, Norway, San Marino and Switzerland) will need to present a negative PCR test conducted less than 72 hours before boarding. Only PCR tests will be accepted. • Travelers will also be required to self-isolate for seven days on arrival, and to take a second PCR test at the end of that period. • Travelers with an urgent reason to travel to France from countries without tests may request a travel pass from their nearest consulate. They will be tested immediately upon arrival in France and must remain in isolation for seven days in an establishment designated by the authorities. • In France you should download the TousAntiCovid app and follow its health recommendations. • Moreover, a nightly curfew from 6 PM to 6 AM is currently in force in Metropolitan France. Also they must be able to present proof of this registration when entering Germany. • Travellers (aged six years or older) that have stayed in Brazil within the last 10 days prior to their entry to Germany are also required to undergo a COVID-19-test up to 48 hours before entry to Germany. Travellers must present the test result digitally or in print in German, English or French to the transport company/airline prior to travelling. • Travellers are required to proceed directly to their destination following entry into Germany and self-isolate at home or other suitable accommodation for 10 days (quarantine). • Exception: transit The obligation to self-isolate at home does not apply in the case of transit through Germany. In this case, however, travellers are obliged to leave Germany immediately. The specific regulations of the federal states apply. • Exception: negative test result after 5 days Depending on the regulations of the federal states, the quarantine may end after 5 days if a test for Coronavirus carried out on the fifth day after entry to Germany or later is negative. 12	GREECE	<p>Until February 8 : mandatory negative COVID PCR test & 7-day quarantine (plus second COVID PCR test for passengers coming from the UK)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Given the current situation of COVID pandemic in Brazil, Brazilian citizens are not allowed to enter Greece, until February 8. Exceptions are provided for Brazilians who a) fall within the scope of Council Recommendation 9208/20 of June 30, 2020 (ex. healthcare professionals, diplomats, transit passengers, students, seafarers etc), and, b) need to travel, either for imperative family reasons (first degree relatives, except of those mentioned in art. 5a of the above mentioned Recommendation), or for imperative professional reasons, such as signature of contract or fulfilment of contractual obligations. Both family and professional imperative reasons must be supported by documented evidence. All international passengers who are allowed to enter Greece (including Greek and other EU citizens) are required to present, upon arrival : A) a negative COVID-19 PCR test, which must have been conducted 72 hours before entering Greece and, B) a certificate of the negative COVID-19 diagnosis, in English, which must include the full name and the passport (if foreigner) or ID number (if Greek citizen) of the incoming passenger. International passengers are also required to (C) fill-in a Passenger Locator Form (PLF), at least 24 hours before check-in. The PLF can be found at https://travel.gov.gr and the Greek Foreign Ministry's website https://www.mfa.gr/index.html "Protocol for Arrivals in Greece"; it includes information on the departure airport, the residence or sojourn address in Greece, the time of sojourn etc. After the electronic submission of the PLF form, the incoming passenger will receive (by e-mail, and by midnight of the day of arrival in Greece) a special barcode, which is considered as a travel document. Incoming passengers should present to the authorized staff of the National Public Health Agency a virtual or hard copy of the completed PLF form, displaying the above-mentioned barcode. International passengers should also present the above mentioned documents (negative COVID-19 PCR test, medical certificate, PLF form with the barcode) to the airline staff, as a precondition to embark the flight to Greece. Notwithstanding the negative COVID test, incoming passengers may still be subjected to random testing, while those coming from high risk countries (e.g. Brazil, see exceptions above) may still be subjected to mandatory testing. The passengers who will be tested, will also have to self-quarantine at the address declared on the PLF, until the test result is issued. Upon a COVID-positive result, they will have to extend the quarantine for a period of 14 days and they will receive further instructions by the National Public Health Agency staff. Notwithstanding the negative PCR COVID test mentioned above, incoming passengers will also have to self-quarantine at the address declared on the PLF, for a period of 7 days. Passengers coming from the United Kingdom, in particular, after the 7-days preventive quarantine, will be subjected to a second mandatory PCR test and will remain in self-quarantine at the address declared on the PLF, until the test result is issued. 13	HUNGARY	<p>Brazilian citizens are allowed only upon a special permission; mandatory 14 days quarantine</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> From 1 September ONLY Hungarian citizens and their family members are allowed to enter to Hungary. Therefore, Brazilian citizens are not allowed to enter Hungary, with the exception of those given a special exemption based on a leniency application. Applications are to be submitted at http://www.police.hu/hu/ugyintezes/elektronikus-ugyintezes/meltanyossagi-kerelem-magyarorszagra-torteno-beutazashoz and will be assessed by the responsible police authorities. A mandatory health check is carried out at the state border. Should medical checks reveal the suspicion of COVID-19 infection; the entry will be denied. Should medical checks not reveal the suspicion of COVID-19 infection, the epidemiological authority would order a mandatory home quarantine for 14 days.

Passengers may be asked to present evidence of their negative/'not detected' result before boarding their airplane or ferry, and will be required to produce this evidence to Immigration Officers on arrival at points of entry to the State. • Children aged six and under will be exempt from the requirement for PCR test, as will essential supply chain workers and a specified set of other rare exceptions. • All passengers arriving into Ireland from overseas are obliged to complete a COVID-19 Passenger Locator Form before entry. In case of refusal to undergo 2nd test, person will remain in quarantine for a period of 14 days.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Given the evolution of the SARS-CoV-2 coronavirus at the international level and the circulation of mutated strains of the SARS-CoV-2 virus whose transmissibility appears to be higher, and which therefore exposes the population to an increased risk of infection, the Ministry of Foreign and European Affairs and the Ministry of Health would like to inform you about the new health measures applicable from 29 January 2021 until 28 February 2021 included, for any travel by air to the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg. • Anyone, regardless of nationality, aged 6 or over, wishing to travel by air to the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg, must present upon boarding the negative result (on paper or electronic document) of a test that detects SARS-CoV-2 nucleic acid, or of a rapid antigen test, performed up to 72 hours before the flight. The negative test result must be presented, if necessary, accompanied by a translation, in one of the administrative languages of Luxembourg or in English. All departures to Luxembourg are therefore concerned, including those from Member states of the European Union or the Schengen area. • In addition, any person traveling by air from a third country, that is a country that is not a member of the European Union or the Schengen area, will have to undergo an additional rapid antigen test upon arrival at Luxembourg airport. In case of refusal to undergo this test, the person will remain in quarantine for a period of 14 days.
